Jafra for Relief and Youth Development



The Jafra Foundation has continued an initiative to improve the infrastructure in the Shatila Camp – Beirut. A series of the rehabilitation works were carried out, including painting the main entrances and installing speed bumps on the main streets and near schools and kindergartens. This is part of the foundation's efforts to reduce recurring traffic accidents and enhance the safety of children and pedestrians. Furthermore, the initiative included street lighting and road improvements in areas near schools and kindergartens, as part of efforts to provide a secured environment and prevent accidents and thefts.

In Rashidieh camp in Tyre, southern Lebanon, the Jafra Foundation launched the first phase of an initiative to develop one of the camp's main walkways. The initiative installed iron handrails on the stairwells, aiming to facilitate the movement of residents, especially the elderly, children, and people with special needs, and ensure their safety while using the stairs.

This step is part of a comprehensive plan to develop the walkway, which includes additional phases currently under implementation.

The foundation also installed an iron bench opposite the stairs to provide a special resting place for the elderly while ascending or descending



The Jafra Football Team from Burj al-Barajneh Camp continues promising sporting journey, achieving victory by victory. They won the World Jerusalem Day Tournament title after defeating the Al-Aqsa Martyrs team 7-3 in the final match held at Al-Radwan Stadium.

In cooperation with the Palestinian Institutions Association (Shabaka), the Jafra Foundation has completed maintenance work on random electrical wiring in some neighborhoods of Ein al-Hilweh camp in Sidon. The project aims to reduce the risks resulting from poor electrical connections and enhance safety standards.

This initiative comes in light of the challenges facing camp residents due to the random entanglement of wiring, which poses a direct threat to their safety, especially with the increasing incidence of electrical short circuits.

The project includes reorganizing connections, repairing faults, and installing solar-powered lighting in dark alleys. It also includes implementing awareness campaigns on the basics of electrical safety.
