Jafra for Relief and Youth Development



The Palestinian Institutions Authority “Shabaka” began the activities of the second session of the “Palestinian National School” in the Beddawi and Nahr al-Bared camps. The course aims to explain the national program to 140 participants, children and adolescents, which includes introducing the history and geography of Palestine, cities and villages, Palestinian heritage and folklore.

The program combines interactive education with national, cultural and artistic activities aimed at strengthening Palestinian identity, consolidating national awareness among the new generation, and developing their connection to their roots and culture.



More than 9,600 Palestinian prisoners held by the occupation, including 84 women and about 350 children, suffer the worst types of oppression and abuse.

Jafra Foundation strongly condemns the practices of the occupation authorities against Palestinian prisoners as a blatant violation of the most basic humanitarian standards stipulated in international laws and treaties on human rights and the rights of the population under occupation.

Jafra calls on the international community and human rights organizations to press for the release of all prisoners, end the occupation, and bring the perpetrators to international courts.



Funded and implemented by the Jafra Foundation, and in partnership with the Palestinian Institutions Authority “Shabaka” in Nahr al-Bared camp, a water distribution project was launched to support displaced families affected by the war.

On the first day, 452 families registered to benefit from the project, where each family will receive 40 liters of drinking water per week for families residing in the camp.

In Beddawi camp, Shabaka also began implementing an initiative to distribute drinking water to IDPs to the camp, in response to the increasing humanitarian needs in light of the conditions of war and displacement.



As a result of the brutal war on the Gaza Strip by the occupation forces, more than 20,000 children killed, while more than 85,000 became orphans.

More than a million children in Gaza are still living in extremely harsh conditions under siege, displacement, hunger, fear, disease and deprivation.

Jafra Foundation declares its solidarity and full support for the children of Gaza and calls on the international community and human rights organizations to assume their responsibilities and end their plight.



The Jafra Foundation's project of rooftop farming is ongoing. It aims to empower camp residents to utilize available spaces and promote a culture of home gardening. This contributes to achieving food self-sufficiency and improving the camp's environment.

The project is part of the Jafra Foundation's efforts to promote community development and support income-generating activities in the camps. This is achieved through practical training and theoretical lectures covering various topics, in addition to ongoing monitoring and providing beneficiaries with the necessary tools and materials for production.
