Jafra for Relief and Youth Development



After two months and a half of hard work and training with 40 young men and women of different ages and nationalities, the Jafra Foundation completed the second cycle of its professional and technical workshops in Jafra TVET center in Beirut, Khaldeh.

The center gave participants the chance to develop their skills and knowledge in the fields of installing and maintaining solar power panels, soap making, graphic design and journalism principles.

They're currently to complete one-month paid internship after which they will receive a professional toolkit that will help them find a proper job opportunity or launch their own businesses.

This project is funded and supported by WHH and BMZ.



With the support and funding of Welthungerhilfe (WHH) and the Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ), the Jafra Foundation continues its project aiming to support small and medium enterprises in the Palestinian refugee camps in Lebanon.

The project recently succeeded in reaching lots of youth and professionals from the camps. Participants get theoretical training to develop their knowledge and increase their skills in running their own business. Then the trainees get a set of tools that will help them improve their work and increase their income, in addition to being carefully followed up by our specialized MSME team to guarantee results.

During the month of January, the Jafra centers in Syria resumed their usual educational program to support and empower students at different educational stages: elementary, preparatory, and secondary.

Education is a priority for Jafra and that's why we ensure the continuity of the educational process especially in every single location where Palestinian refugees reside. Jafra staff and volunteers give educational sessions and cultural activities for different age categories to help them make up what they missed because of the past lockdowns and enable them to improve their academic results in hopes of giving them skills and information that helps them build a better future.



In January, the Jafra center in Qusaya organized a practical painting workshop where 16 women of different ages participated.

The participants learned the basics of painting, lines, styles and different schools in this field of art, under the supervision of a specialized artist.

At the end of the training, the participants have succeeded at producing a number of paintings that demonstrated a high level of artisanship and a notable difference in their personal styles.



In June, the South Damascus Jafra center offered an group of special activities and workshops for different age categories starting with the educational program that helped students improve their academic grades and increase their knowledge. In addition, Jafra organized a number of workshops such as an English class for women, not to mention the social activities held by the volunteers of the Jafra center. The initiative got the liking of everyone.
