Students come from all over Lebanon and new batch of participants will be welcomes every 2 months.



In cooperation with the “Alternative Cinema Platform” group, Jafra began to project films in the camps’ streets. The first projection was a success. The film *Jenin, Jenin* brought an audience made of several generation of Palestinians from Burj el Barajneh camp. The participants were able to reunite behind their shared struggle—the right to return to their ancestral homeland of Palestine—after experiencing emotion and engaging exchanges.
