This survey summarizes the basic needs of the population in the Jafra Foundation's areas of work in Syria, to the intervention required to target the various groups of community to bridge the gap in the lack of basic services, trainings or projects needed by the residents of the Foundations areas of work:

- Identifying the demographic structure of the Foundation's areas of work in general (the population, the number of: IDPs, children, males, females, persons with disabilities, the unemployment rate for males, and the unemployment rate for females).
- Identifying the services in the Foundation's areas of work.
- Identifying the basic needs of food or non-food items in the Foundation's areas of work.
- Identifying the key sectors in the markets of the Foundation's areas of work and the challenges facing the population in accessing this market and the challenges faced by these sectors that prevent expansion and growth.
- Identify the conditions of education and the basic educational needs in the Foundation's areas of work.
- Identify the key professions in the Foundation's areas of work and what professions exist/non-exist and identify the possibility of coordination and cooperation with the owners of these professions.
- Studying the conditions of households and their income sources of in the Foundation's areas of work to identify the most basic needs of these families.
- A detailed study of the conditions of youth in the Foundation's areas of work to determine the most important vocational or developmental training needed, whether to help them in their studies, or to empower them economically to enable them to access the labor market.

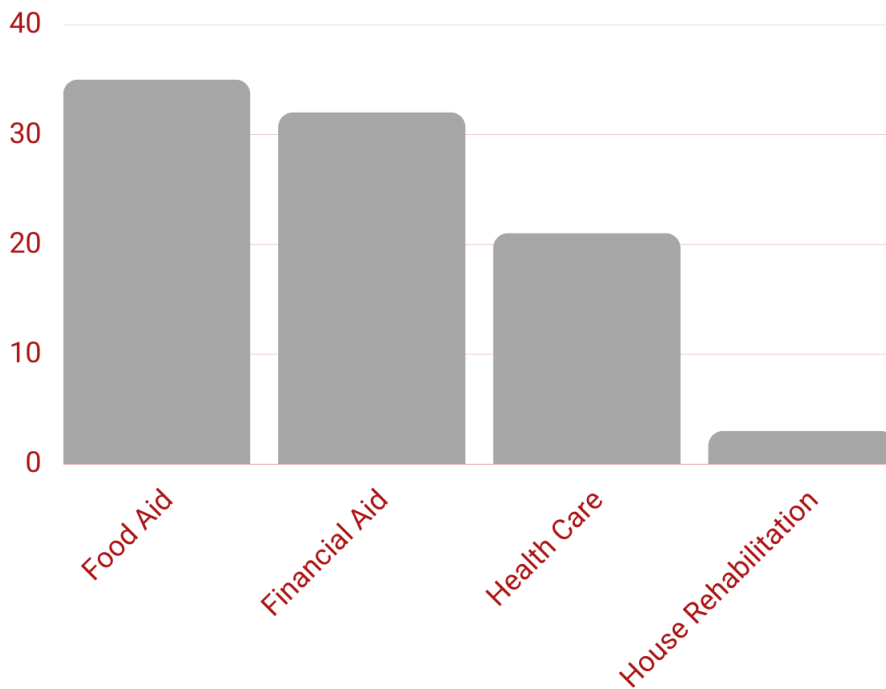

- Lack of job opportunities

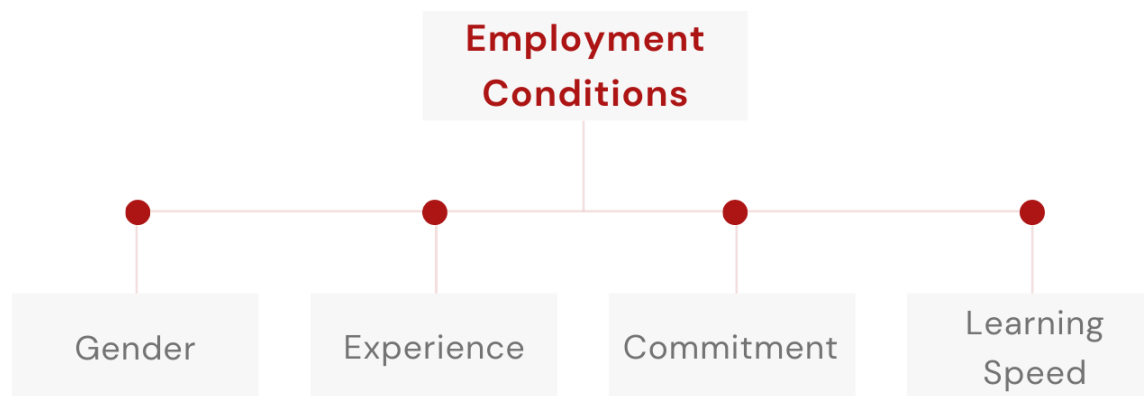

Services in the Camp:


Services in the Camp	
Sanitation	Pretty bad: periodic malfunctions
Cooking gas	Subsidized gas insufficient, many households rely on the black market
Electricity	Long irregular cut-off hours in addition to the periodic malfunction
Diesel	Accessible only via the black market
Potable water	Unavailable, purchased from tankers
Daily use water	Insufficient to cover the household's need households rely on tankers
Internet	Available- bad quality
Bread	Subsidized bread is insufficient, people rely on the black market where price is tripled
Medical services	There are but insufficient medical points which lack for specialties and relief services.

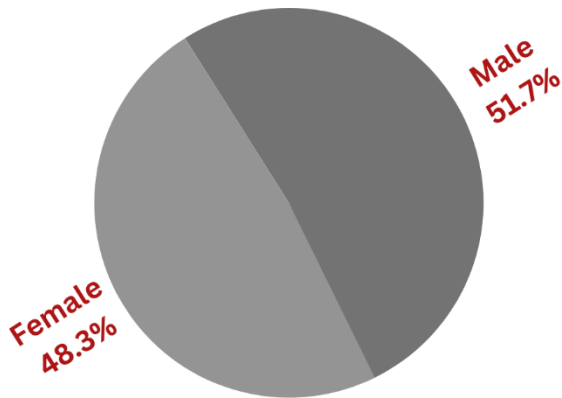

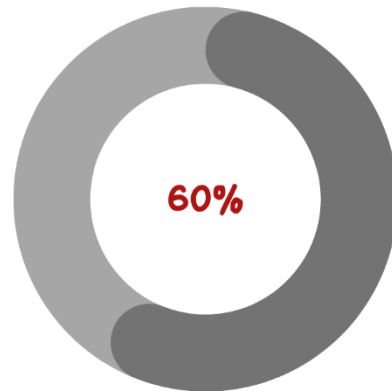

2. Poor financial conditions
3. Child labor
4. Early marriage
5. Ignorance of the parents
6. School bullying
7. Children are neglected by their caregivers.
8. Culture of the low importance of education
9. The suffering of children and teachers from stress
